

A RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A COUNCIL POLICY FOR
HONORARY STREET NAME DESIGNATION
AND CODIFYING SUCH POLICY

WHEREAS, requests are occasionally made to the Mayor and Council to name City streets for prominent individuals in the community, or in honor of specific events or groups;
and

WHEREAS, the renaming of existing streets in this manner has cost implications and can create confusion; and

WHEREAS, Council Bill 93-23 established a policy regarding renaming of streets; and

WHEREAS, the concept of establishing honorary street names in addition to the legal street name serves the stated purpose of recognizing citizens and groups in our community;
and

WHEREAS, honorary street name designations have been applied successfully in other communities in Illinois and elsewhere.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS, as follows:

Section 1. That the policy for honorary street name designations, attached hereto as Exhibit A, is hereby approved.

Section 2. That this Resolution shall be codified as part of Volume 2 of the Municipal Code of Champaign, 1985.


Section 3. That the City Clerk is hereby authorized to send a copy of this

Resolution to the Public Works Director.





**SUBJECT: HONORARY STREET NAME DESIGNATION POLICY -
INFORMATION/RESPONSE REQUESTED**

A. Introduction: The purpose of this memo is to provide a proposed policy and procedures for implementation of honorary street name designations. Council comments are requested by February 29, 2000.

B. Recommended Action: That Council review the information and provide comments to Mary Anderson or Dan Coats at Public Works. The policy would be approved by resolution at a regular Council meeting.

C. Background: Council discussed honorary street name designations during the December 7, 1999 Study Session. At that time, Council identified the following restrictions and process for honorary street name designations.

1. Honorary street name designations should be limited to individuals, organizations, entities and events of local significance to Champaign.
2. The attached application form should be completed and submitted directly to the Mayor or City Council.
3. The application form will be reviewed and six Council Members should support the request to review the designation in order for it to be discussed in a Study Session.
4. If the request is approved by Study Session poll, a Council Bill will be prepared, outlining the proposal and providing an estimate of the cost for sign manufacture and installation. Six votes will be required for approval.
5. Upon Council approval, the Public Works Department will implement the street name designation.

D. Discussion:

1. Application Form. Attached is a proposed application form for requesting honorary street name designations. The forms could be made available at libraries, schools, Park District facilities, and all City buildings. The application forms would be submitted directly to Council.
2. Review of Request. If six Council Members decide that the request should be reviewed in Study Session, Public Works staff will review the request to determine a cost estimate for the request.
3. Program Change. The implementation of honorary street name designations will have an impact on Public Works' Traffic and Lighting resources. Currently, the City replaces all street name and regulatory signs in an area on an approximate ten year cycle. The budget is based on the replacement of all existing signs in the area on that cycle. As a result, there are not funds identified in the Public Works budget for developing additional new signs for the City. Depending upon the popularity of this program and the number of new signs to be installed, there could be significant cost impacts. The Public Works Department will reflect this need as the requests are considered by Council.
4. Schedule for Implementation. Upon Council review of this memo, Staff will make any changes recommended by Council and develop a final policy for Council adoption by March 21, 2000. Therefore, Staff requests that Council inform us of proposed changes no later than February 29, 2000.

E. Community Input: The original program proposal was based on interest of some in the community to rename streets in honor of individuals or organizations. Staff did not seek specific input on developing the final application process.

F. Budget and Staffing Impact: As indicated previously, the Public Works Department does not have funds identified to establish a new program. Therefore, each request will be reviewed and a cost estimate prepared for Council consideration. Minor costs can probably be handled by delaying other sign work. The honorary street name signs may be manufactured by Public Works' staff, or by contract. It is estimated that each sign will cost about \$50. Costs include labor and materials for both manufacture and installation of the signs.

SUBJECT: EXPLANATION OF COUNCIL BILL NO. 2000- 77

A. Introduction: The purpose of this Council Bill is to establish a policy and procedure to allow the designation of honorary street names in the City of Champaign.

B. Recommended Action: Staff recommends approval of the Council Bill establishing a Council policy and a process to designate honorary street names.

C. Background:

1. **Previous Council Discussion.** Council discussed honorary street name designations during the December 7, 1999 Study Session. During the Study Session, Council identified some restrictions and issues that they wanted addressed in establishing a process for honorary street name designation. These included the following items.

- a. Honorary street name designations should be limited to individuals, organizations, entities and events of local significance to Champaign.
- b. The application form (see Attachment 1) should be submitted directly to the Mayor or a City Council member.
- c. The application can be completed and submitted by any individual or group in Champaign.
- d. The completed application will be reviewed in Study Session before formal Council action is taken.
- e. If the request is approved in a Study Session poll, a Council Bill will be prepared, outlining the proposed designation and providing an estimate of cost impacts including sign manufacture and installation and any other costs that might be incurred.
- f. Upon approval, the Public Works Department will implement the honorary street name designation.

2. **Other Council Discussion.** During the December Study Session, some Council members supported the idea that a super-majority of six votes would be required to implement the honorary street name designation. Subsequent to the discussion, the City Attorney suggested that this super-majority requirement may necessitate the need for Code changes, and Council

members were asked via a staff memo if they wished to pursue such changes. Based on the informal poll of Council by staff, the policy proposed herein does not require the super-majority vote for honorary designation.

3. Application Form. Attachment 1 is a proposed application form for requesting honorary street name designation. The forms will be made available at all City facilities, libraries, schools, Park District facilities, and can be downloaded from the City's website. The forms require submission directly to the Mayor and City Council. The proposed application form was provided to Council in a previous memo only. The form has been changed based on the suggestion of Council Member Sher Hampel that the application include a short essay to provide justification for the honorary street name designation.

4. Proposed Process. The proposed procedure includes the following steps.

- a. Individuals or groups wishing to propose honorary street name designation will complete the application form and submit it to the Mayor or Council Member.
- b. The Mayor or Council Member will determine if there is sufficient support on Council for the request to be reviewed in Study Session. If so, the request will be forwarded to the City Manager to schedule it for Study Session.
- c. The Public Works Department will prepare a brief memo to Council for the Study Session that identifies any cost impacts associated with the request.
- d. If the Study Session poll indicates a simple majority support for the proposal, a Council Bill will be prepared.
- e. Upon final approval by City Council, the Public Works Department will install the signs.

After installation, the honorary street name designation will be reviewed in about ten years, or whenever the honorary street name signs are scheduled for replacement by the Traffic and Lighting Section of Public Works.

D. Alternatives:

1. Establish the Council policy and procedure for honorary street name designations as recommended in the previous paragraphs.
2. Do not approve the Council policy and procedure for honorary street name designations and provide alternative direction to staff.

E. Discussion of Alternatives:

Alternative 1 would approve the Council Bill, establishing the Council policy and the process for honorary street name designations.

a. Advantages

- allows for honorary recognition of persons, organizations or events of local significance to Champaign

- provides additional opportunity to build community or neighborhood identity in Champaign
- attractive honorary signs can tie in with neighborhood recognition and corridor/entryway signage goals

b. Disadvantages

- there is some cost associated with Council consideration and staff implementation of honorary street name designations
- having two signs on streets may result in some confusion

Alternative 2 would result in Council's deciding not to adopt a policy establishing honorary street name designations, and providing alternative direction to staff.

a. Advantages

- if no program is implemented, no new costs will be incurred

b. Disadvantages

- eliminates an opportunity to market the community and assist a neighborhood that is attempting to build its identity

F. Community Input: The original recommendation to Council to establish a policy and procedure for establishing honorary street name designations arose from requests from citizens to allow street name changes on a more liberal basis than currently practiced by the City. A discussion of the topic was held at Study Session on December 7, 1999, at which the Council determined that the honorary street name designation was a good compromise that met the goals of citizens who desired street name changes, while not incurring the significant cost and other negative impacts associated with renaming streets. No additional input was sought for the proposed policy and procedures outlined herein.

G. Budget and Staffing Impact:

1. Budget Impact. Staff estimates that the cost of materials and labor to manufacture and install honorary street name signs is approximately \$50 per sign. These costs are not included in the current or proposed budget for the Public Works Department. Depending upon the number of signs proposed to be installed, the Public Works Department will either request a program change for signs, or will defer other sign work to manufacture and install the signs upon Council approval of an honorary designation. The budget impact will be outlined in the reports provided to City Council when honorary street name designations are considered for final approval.

2. Staffing Impact. There will be a staffing impact whenever additional signs are proposed to be installed. Depending upon the number of signs, this program may interfere with ongoing staff work for area sign replacements and pavement markings. The impact on staffing will be

provided in the Council reports when honorary street name designations are considered for final approval.

PROCEDURE FOR HONORARY STREET NAME DESIGNATION

Eligibility: Honorary street name designations will be limited to individuals, organizations, entities and events of local significance for Champaign.

Process:

1. Requestors must complete the attached application form and present it to the Mayor or City Council Member.
2. If six (6) Council Members support the consideration of the request, it will be scheduled for review at a City Council Study Session.
3. The Public Works Department will review the request to provide a cost estimate for Council consideration.
4. If the designation is recommended in Study Session, a Council Bill will be prepared for the next regular Council agenda. Six (6) votes are required for final approval of the designation.
5. Public Works will make and install the signs within thirty (30) days of Council approval.
6. The City replaces street name signs on an approximate ten (10) year cycle. Honorary street name designations will be reviewed and considered by Council for continuation as new street name signs are being placed in that area.



Section 2. That this Resolution shall be codified as part of Volume 2 of the Municipal Code of Champaign, 1985.



SUBJECT: EXPLANATION OF COUNCIL BILL NO. 2001-79

A. Introduction: This Council Bill would approve an amendment to the policy establishing the honorary street name program, limiting the number of designations to 12 per year.

B. Recommended Action: Staff recommends approval of the Council Bill, amending the policy for honorary street names.

C. Background:

1. Adoption of Honorary Street Name Policy. On April 4, 2000, City Council adopted a Council policy for honorary street name designations (Council Bill No. 2000-77). The policy provides guidelines for establishing honorary street names to recognize individual citizens, organizations, entities and special events. Applications are supported by a short essay that provides justification for the designation. Five Council members must express their support for the request prior to it being scheduled and discussed at Study Session. If the request is recommended at the Study Session, then staff will prepare a Council Bill for placement on the agenda at the next regular Council meeting for formal vote. The Public Works Department will review the request to provide cost estimates and make and install the signs within 30 days after Council approval. All honorary street names will be reviewed and considered for continuation by Council approximately every ten years, as part of the City's street sign replacement cycle.

2. Amendments. To date, Council has received and approved six requests for honorary street name designations. As these requests are presented and discussed, Council Members have noted amendments they would like to see to the policy. Staff has incorporated Council comments into this amendment, as discussed at study session on February 27, 2001.

D. Alternatives:

1. Approve the Council Bill, amending the policy for honorary street name designations.
2. Do not approve the Council Bill and provide further direction to staff.

E. Discussion of Alternatives:

Alternative 1 would amend the policy to reflect that honorary street name designations will be limited to 12 per year, or one per month.

a. Advantages.

- Limits the number of honorary designation throughout the City
- Limits Council review time

b. Disadvantages.

- Council time to review the requests will be shortened

Alternative 2 would not amend the policy. Council could provide other direction to staff as to amendments.

a. Advantages.

- The current policy provisions remain the same
- Council review time will remain the same
- Allows for unlimited honorary street name designations, as approved by Council

b. Disadvantages.

- More Council and staff time will be required to address citizen requests

F. Community Input: No community input was sought on this amendment. It appears the community has responded favorably to the institution of the policy.

H. Budget and Staffing Impact:

1. Budget Impact. The cost of materials to make a honorary street name sign is approximately \$75. Limiting the number of requests will result in less signs being made, and be a cost-saving in the sign replacement budget.

2. Staffing Impact. It takes approximately one hour of staff in the Traffic & Lighting Section to make and install the honorary street name signs. In addition, staff and Council time will be reduced by limiting the number of requests to be reviewed.

**SUBJECT: HONORARY STREET NAME 10-YEAR RENEWAL PROCESS –
INFORMATION ONLY**

A. Introduction: The purpose of this report is to obtain Council input on the process staff proposes to use to renew honorary street names that are 10-years old.

B. Recommended Action: This report is for information only and no action is required. If Council members have any questions or suggestions regarding the honorary street name 10-year renewal process, please feel free to contact Debra Windlan at the Public Works Department. If Council members would like to discuss this at a Study Session, please contact the City Manager.

C. Previous Council Action:

- Council adopted a policy for honorary street names on April 4, 2000 (CB 2000-77).
- Council amended the policy to limit the number of honorary street designations to 12 per year on April 17, 2001 (CB 2001-79).
- Council has approved one honorary street in 2000; seven in 2001; three in 2002; two in 2004; four in 2005; four in 2006; four in 2007; and two in 2009.

D. Background:

1. Honorary Streets. The City started an honorary street name program in 2000. Currently, the City has designated 27 streets as honorary.

Attached to this report (Exhibit A) is a spreadsheet listing all honorary street names, the date they were designated, their location, Council Bill number, who requested the designation, and the reason why the request was made. Also attached (Exhibit B) is a map illustrating the location of all the honorary street names. Both Exhibits A and B are located on the City's website.

2. Honorary Street Request. The City receives requests to honor individuals, organizations, entities, and events of local significance to Champaign. The requests are submitted in application form to the Mayor or a City Council member for determination of sufficient support from Council for the request to be reviewed in Study Session. If so, the completed application is reviewed in Study Session before formal Council action is taken. If the request is approved with simple majority support in a Study Session poll, a Council Bill is prepared for Council approval. Upon final approval by City Council, the Public Works Department installs the signs. According to the procedure adopted by Council in 2000, every 10 years the honorary street name designation needs to be reviewed to determine whether or not the designation should continue.

3. Proposed 10-Year Renewal Process. Staff proposes the following renewal process for honorary street names:

- Once a year, staff will prepare an Information Only Memorandum to Council informing Council of the honorary street names that will become 10-years old that year.
- Staff will also contact, if they can be found, the person or group who made the original request for the honorary street designation and inform them the time limit for the street designation will expire.
- If a Council Member, individual, or group would like to renew the street name designation, the requestor will need to follow the same process used for any honorary street name designation. Specifically, an application needs to be completed, if there is sufficient support, the request will be reviewed in Study Session. The entire process is outlined above in Section 2.
- If there is no request to renew the honorary street name 90 days after the Information Only Memorandum has been sent to Council and the original requestor has been given 90 days notification of the expiration, Public Works will remove the honorary street signs and the designation will expire.

E. Community Input: No community input was sought for this Information Only Memorandum.

F. Budget Impact: The cost of materials for each small sign is approximately \$75; the larger signs cost \$135 each.

G. Staffing Impact: It takes approximately two hours of staff time for the Traffic and Lighting Section to make and install each honorary street name sign.
